Late 18th-century Europe was a place of instability, rocketing from the Medieval and Renaissance worlds into the Age of Enlightenment. The French Revolution (1789) was the most dramatic and violent political manifestation of the change, but the aesthetic revolution in the musical realm was no less cataclysmic. The contrast between the musical careers of J.S. Bach and that of his second son Philipp Emmanuel is a perfect example: JSB's output was largely centred around the Lutheran church and faith, while CPE's world was the Enlightenment court of Frederick the Great. JSB lived in a theocentric universe, while at the same time his son (a mere 180 km away) was immersed in a culture of humanism: Luther next to Descartes! JSB provided his students with a rigorous training in the craft of composition: singing, keyboard technique, basso continuo, motivic development, counterpoint, rhetoric, and formal architecture were all staples of Bach's pedagogy. All of Bach's students would have been fully capable of composing mighty fugues, ostinato works and choral cantatas, but already during the last years of JSB's life these forms had largely fallen out of fashion, and we see the rise of the Sonata (in its early pre-Classical form), the improvisatory (and often spectacularly virtuosic) Fantasia, and the variation cycle in increasingly extrovert forms. CPE Bach was a fine organist and harpsichordist, though he was most famous as a clavichordist, playing that instrument of infinite nuance with consummate skill and subtlety.

Inspired by his collection of historical keyboards that includes harpsichords, an organ and a 1782 Ganer square piano, Jonathan Oldengarm seeks to find the most natural way of the hand and ear in partnership with each instrument. He has recorded for the ATMA Classique, Klanglogo and Analekta labels, and collaborated recently with the Ottawa Bach Choir, Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, Elora Singers, the Montreal and Toronto Symphony Orchestras, Trinity Bach Project, the Gallery Players, North Winds Concerts and Cappella Intima. An enthusiastic teacher, Jonathan has made a specialty teaching keyboard harmony, improvisation, continuo, score reading, accompanying at the organ, hymn playing—the professional keyboard artist's essential skills. Jonathan is an adjunct music faculty member at the University of Toronto, and since 2022 has been Minister of Music and Organist at Metropolitan United Church in Toronto, home to Canada's largest pipe organ and Canada's oldest tuned carillon. Under his leadership the Metropolitan Festival Choir has recently performed Bach's Markus Passion (Koolstra reconstruction), Schütz's Musikalische Exequien, Handel's Brockes Passion, Brahms Ein deutsches Requiem and other masterworks; in April 2026 the ensemble presents J.S. Bach's St. John Passion.

Ethan Duan is Wayne C. Vance Organ Scholar at Toronto Metropolitan United Church. He attends St. Michael's Choir School in Toronto, where he studies organ with David Simon and piano with Clare Pengally. In 2024 he was first-prize winner of the Stanley Osborne Competition, by unanimous choice of the jury. Ethan also sings at liturgies and weddings at St. Michael's Cathedral Basilica as a chorister, and conducts the Choir School's Benefit Choir.

Daniel Hamin Go has performed across three continents, making appearances at the Berliner Philharmonie, Cadogan, Carnegie Hall, Flagey Studios, and Konzerthaus Berlin. As an avid chamber musician, Go has received invitations to festivals including the Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival, IMS Prussia Cove, Kronberg Academy, Krzyzowa Music, Mendelssohn on Mull, Music Academy of the West, Ravinia's Steans Institute of Music, Tsinandali Festival, and Yellow Barn, and his chamber partners include Jonathan Biss, Glenn Dicterow, Miriam Fried, David Geber, Ida Kavafian, Richard O'Neill, Daniel Philips, Rachel Podger, Wolfgang Redik, Fazil Say, Barry Shiffman, and Jean-Claude Vanden Eynden.

Go's 24-25 season includes appearances at Big Lake Arts, Caledon Music Festival, Kallos Chamber Music Series, Princeton University's 'Sound Kitchen' series, and a Canadian tour with Debut Atlantic. With the generous support of Canada Council for the Arts and Ontario Arts Council, Go is looking forward to releasing his debut album ARIRANG with Orchid Classics.

Go's education took place in six institutions across five countries, regularly participating in masterclasses with Steven Isserlis, Ferenc Rados, and Rita Wagner. Go received a Bachelor of Music from the Manhattan School of Music under the tutelage of Julia Lichten and David Geber, a Master of Music at the Hochschule für Musik 'Hanns Eisler' Berlin in the class of Nicolas Altstaedt, and as a recipient of the prestigious Bicentenary Award and the Drake Calleja Trust Award, Go completed an Advanced Diploma at the Royal Academy of Music. During the 2021-22 season, Go was an artist-in-residence at the coveted Queen Elisabeth Music Chapel working closely with Gary Hoffman. During the 2022-23 season, Go held a fellowship position at the Royal Conservatory of Music's Rebanks Family Fellowship and International Residency Program.
